Home for the chag! A participatory family style haggada extravaganza!

Missing home? Want to have a chance to share your family's (crazy! fun! fantastic!) traditions? Well then this is the seder for you! Although we promise not to nag you to take a nap before, expect a late night! We hope to have every participant lead a different part of the seder or present something they feel especially passionate about. We will be using a mixture of haggadot (including the official "Brodie Family Haggadah") so feel free to bring your own. Once you sign up you will be contacted about what you would like to lead or discuss at the seder. So get ready to be pelted with plagues at our wonderful participatory seder!

Traditional Seder

The traditional seder is open to participants of all levels. Whether you grew up having a seder every year with your family or whether you have never been to a seder, you are welcome to join us. No experience or knowledge of Hebrew is necessary, and no question is too simple. This seder will include all the traditional components conducted in an explanatory fashion for those who wish to know more. But, as with any good seder, the questions will probably be more numerous and more interesting than the answers. Those with more knowledge and experience are encouraged to help lead and explain the seder.

Kiddy Meal

In the Haggadah, we learn about four different types of children--one of them being the "simple" child. At this seder, we will try to reach out for that simple child inside each of us. While going through the traditional Passover service, our discussions will focus on WHY each ritual is performed--as if doing it for the first time, we'll examine how it came about & what significance it has in the greater context of the Exodus. And to help you find that inner, questioning child, we'll have plenty of games, skits, and activities.
